COUNTY BOROUGH OF SOUTHAMPTON.

BYE-LAWS

For the good rule and government of the County Borough of Southampton and for the prevention of nuisances, made by the Council of the said County Borough in pursuance of Section 23 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, at a Meeting of the Council held on the eleventh day of September, 1912, at which forty-four Members of the Council were present, being not less than two-thirds of the whole number of the Council.

I.—No person shall spit on the floor, side or wall of any public carriage, or of any public hall, public waiting room, public shelter, or place of public entertainment, whether admission thereto be obtained by payment or not.

2.—Any person offending against the foregoing Bye-Law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds.
