BYELAWS

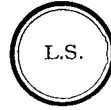
for the good rule and government of the County Borough of Southampton and for the prevention of nuisances, made by the Council of the said County Borough, in pursuance of Section 23 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, at a Meeting of the Council, held on Wednesday, the 12th day of June, 1907, at which thirty-seven Members of the Council were present, being not less than two-thirds of the whole number of the Council.

1.—No person shall in any street or market place distribute or give away to the obstruction or annoyance of passengers, or strew any handbill or pamphlet advertising any trade, business, or profession, or the sale of any goods, wares, or merchandise, or any lecture, entertainment or performance.

This Byelaw shall not apply to the delivery by any person of any such handbill or pamphlet to any house, office or place of business.

2.—Any person offending against the foregoing Byelaw shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds.
